# Distinguished Speakers Report

Homer White, Distinguished Speakers Program Co-Chair

The Distinguished Speakers Program began the year 2005 with all-new membership. Lesley Osborne and Homer White serve as co-chairs; other members are Hal Jankowski and Katie Yunker.

In April, the committee, in conjunction with the Central Kentucky Council for Peace and Justice, assisted in hosting Kathy Kelly, the founder of Voices in the Wilderness, an organization that provides medical assistance to the citizens of Iraq and, since the end of sanctions, has attempted to be a witness for peace in that country. Ms. Kelley spoke at several venues in central Kentucky and delivered an address at Newman Center on April 15.

The committee is in the process of locating speakers for the 2005-2006 academic year and beyond. To date, two exciting speakers have currently indicated their willingness to visit the Newman Center.

Sister Tracey Matthia Dugas, who recently took her final vows with the Daughters of Saint Paul, is a student of religion and popular culture. Her interactive, multimedia presentation is entitled, "Even in the Darkness: Encountering

God in Popular Films."

Dr. Glenn Hinson retired in 1999 from the position of Professor of Spirituality and John F. Loftis Professor of Church History at The Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond, Virginia. He had previously taught for more than thirty years at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville. In 1960 he began taking Southern Seminary students to the Abbey of Gethsemani. Thomas Merton served as their host. Among his numerous books are, The Early Church: Dawn to the Middle Ages and A Serious Call to a Contemplative Lifestyle." Dr. Hinson has membership in significant ecumenical organizations and has participated in the Catholic/Southern Baptist Scholars' Dialogues and in the International Catholic/Baptist Conversations. Among his honors is the Cuthbert Allen Memorial Award for Ecumenism, from the Ecumenical Institute of Belmont Abbey/ Wake Forest University. The title of his address is "Christian Contemplative Spirituality in Ecumenical Perspective."

# Grants Support Diocesan-wide Projects

The Grant Program administered by the Newman Foundation, Inc., strives to provide funding for projects that support both local and diocesan-wide projects, to aid in worship, fellowship and service consistent with the foundation goals.

The Foundation provided \$2609.80 for partial support to both Holy Spirit Newman Center, and St. Stephen Newman Center to send students to the National Catholic Coalition Conference in Washington, D.C., in December 2004. In addition, one student attended the National Catholic Student Coalition in Houston in February 2005, as one of the national Board members, a first

for a University of Kentucky student.

Another partial grant of \$1000 provided the opportunity for three Newman Center staff members to attend the National Convention of Catholic Campus Ministry Association in San Antonio in January 2005. The Newman Center Women's Lenten Retreat received a \$250 grant to pay for expenses for a retreat speaker and facilitator at their spring retreat at the Loretto Motherhouse in Nerinx. Assistance for 3 spring break trips, to a rural community in Louisiana; Camden, NJ; and Miami, FL, provided opportunity for students to put their faith in action in repairing housing and other facilities, share social

action activities, and serve people in need of help, both financially and spiritually.

Two special projects initiated by the Newman Center Health Ministries Program were also funded. The Yoga class received \$100 for purchase of equipment. The cost of attending a CPR class was made affordable by a \$400 grant. All the projects improved fellowship among all participants, provided hope for others and spread the spirit of sharing and support with many other people, fulfilling the purpose and goal of the grant program of NFI.


