A letter from the NFI funded UK Chair of Catholic Studies: Dr. David G. Hunter

Newman Foundation Supporters,

I have had the privilege of an extended sabbatical year because of fellowships received from different sources. From August to December of 2013, I was a Senior Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Study at Central European University in Budapest. From January 2014 until December 2014, I am a Visiting Scholar at the Faculty of Theology and Religious Studies of the Catholic University of Leuven, Belgium. Living in Europe has provided an opportunity to travel and lecture in different countries and venues, from the Faculty of Theology of the Catholic University of Ružomberok in Košice, Slovakia to the School of History, Classics, and Archaeology of the University of Edinburgh, as well as in Budapest and Leuven. The coming months include lectures at Durham and Oxford in England, and talks at conferences in Rome, Vienna, Regensburg (the theology faculty of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI). Obviously, sabbaticals are not for “rest”!

But the most important aspect of this year is the opportunity for sustained research and writing. I am working on a new history of the origins of priestly celibacy in the early church, which will be published by Oxford University Press. I hope to have the text largely completed by the end of my sabbatical. I have also recently completed a lengthy chapter on “Married Priests in Eastern and Western Christianity” to appear soon in the *Brill Companion to Medieval Priesthood*.

None of this would have been possible without the Cottrill-Rolfes Chair of Catholic Studies. As I have written in the Acknowledgements of my forthcoming book: “Special thanks are owed to Dr. Carol Cottrill and Thomas Rolfes for their hopeful vision of church and theology and commitment to Catholic education, and to the Newman Foundation Inc. for its continued support of the Catholic Studies chair at the University of Kentucky.”

A letter from the President

Readers,

Pope Francis has focused on the marginalized and on the poor, leading through acts of charity, acceptance, and love. In doing so he has captured the attention, admiration, and imagination of many around the globe, regardless of their belief system. By embracing us all regardless of our differences, he is making the Catholic Church more accessible, more now than ever before. He remains steadfastly focused on commonalities -- bringing people together rather than dividing them. By taking a stance saying that the “theology of women in the church” continues to be underdeveloped, he embodies the meaning of equality. His words and actions constantly challenge us to think differently -- to look at self and others differently.

The Pope’s examples of humility and love are refreshing, his hesitancy to judge exemplary. Nearly 100 attendees listened to an intellectually passionate and spiritually fulfilling distinguished speaker, Dr. Margaret Ralph, in October 2013.

Dr. Margaret Ralph worked for the Diocese of Lexington for 16 years as the Secretary of Educational Ministries, and she also taught at the Lexington Theological Seminary. An author of 15 books on Scripture, and, for many, Dr. Ralph stands as an example of a strong, Catholic woman who embodies strong faith and mind.

While the Pope has explained that an over concentration on specific issues threatens the moral structure of the church and causes us to “lose the freshness and fragrance of the Gospel,” Dr. Ralph helped us refresh that fragrance through her contextualist approach to Scripture. Her lecture, *Nourished and Ruled by Scripture*, encouraged participants to contemplate

the intent of the author in reading, studying, and interpreting Scripture.

Dr. Ralph’s presentation was sponsored by the NFI’s Distinguished Speaker’s series. It is through the financial generosity of our donors that we may continue to provide similar programs that enrich the spiritual and intellectual lives of our community. We thank our supporters and know that our continued dedication to our commonalities -- our focus on the Newman Apostolate and our steadfast determination to bring people together -- will continue to move us forward, as a community and as an organization!



